

Does being successful mean trying to be different than other Latinos? Do you think being a Latino means not being American? Do you sometimes wonder what causes conflict in how different ethnic groups see each other in this country? These and many other questions of identity will be explored in a fun, challenging, and informative session designed to help you consider – “¿Quien Crees Que Eres?” – “Who do you think you are?”

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Keynote Presenters

ABOUT CARLOS OJEDA JR:

He's been called one of the most dynamic speakers under thirty in America today and as a community advocate, he has worked extensively with high school and college aged Latino youths, spreading his message of education, leadership, community activism and entrepreneurship. His compassion, strength and genuineness have inspired the youth, educators, and leaders whose paths he has crossed along his journey as an innovative and masterful communicator.

The remarkable journey of his life began in the streets of Newark, New Jersey and later to Reading, Pennsylvania where his immigrant parents saw opportunities for themselves and for their first generation Puerto Rican children. Growing up proved to be a difficult task, particularly school. Not understanding his social, economical and cultural background, many of his high school teachers told him he would never amount to anything. One teacher once called him, "the greatest piece of garbage he had ever seen."

Yet his drive, passion and dreams led him to overcome those obstacles and pursue a career of life learning and educational success, being the first person in his family to graduate from college with honors. His experiences have led him to always remind Latino youth to, "never, ever, ever let anyone tell you who you are or what you will become. That's your destiny to fulfill, no one else's."

Judge Gutierrez, the son of a farm worker, faced many challenges in his life, but he elected to pursue his education. His degrees include a GED through the Job Corps; a bachelor of arts degree, cum laude, in elementary education from Boise State University; and a juris doctor degree from the University of California, Hastings Law School.

He practiced law in southwest Idaho for over 10 years. In November 1993, Gov. Cecil Andrus appointed him district judge, making him the first Hispanic judge in the state of Idaho. Subsequently, he was twice re-elected to his position. Gov. Dirk Kempthorne appointed him to serve on the Idaho Court of Appeals beginning in January 2002.

Judge Gutierrez was inducted into the National Job Corps Hall of Fame, has received numerous awards for his extensive public service and continues to serve on several boards and commissions to help the community. He frequently takes time to visit area schools and other youth organizations, to inspire students to pursue their education.


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Luis Ibarra – Moderator of Siempre Latinos workshop on Friday, and facilitator of the Friday night Mi Familia activities

Luis Ibarra has been involved with the Hispanic Youth Symposium since its beginning. Although he lives in Arizona, he has made a personal commitment to the leadership development of Idaho's students. He is president and chief executive officer of Friendly House, a comprehensive family service agency serving the Latino community in Phoenix.

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Workshop Presenters

Mary Adamic, Experiment with a Chemist – Mary earned a bachelor's degree with majors in chemistry, biology and secondary education certification from Western State College of Colorado, a master's degree in analytical chemistry from the University of North Dakota, and a master's degree in Waste Management from the University of Idaho. She has worked at Idaho National Laboratory for over 20 years and is currently located at the Materials and Fuels Complex, assigned to support Homeland Security activities. She has taught chemistry for almost 25 years at the high school and college levels.

Shannon Bowman, Issues to Action A – Shannon returned to the Department of Energy Idaho Site in 2006 after six years in Texas. Currently, she is manager of Human Resources Services for CH2M – WG Idaho, LLC. She has been affiliated with HYS in various roles since it was on the drawing board in the late 1980s. She has attended HYS 19 of the 20 times it has been held since the inaugural event in 1990. She also supports HYS by serving as the chair of Gem State Diversity Initiatives (GSDI), the entity that raises money for scholarships awarded in the competitive events at HYS. She is an Idaho native whose passions are social justice and immigration reform.

Bevin Brush, Atomic Mouse Trap – Bevin has worked at Idaho National Laboratory for 36 years. He has a bachelor's degree in corporate training and a master's degree in training and development from Idaho State University. He has extensive knowledge of transportation, analytical chemistry, plant services, waste management, and safeguards and security.

Terry Danzer, It Could Happen to You – Terry currently holds a 3rd degree black belt through ChungDoKwan USA. He has been studying Chung Do Kwan tae kwon do for over eight years. He operates Pocatello Traditional Tae Kwon Do, a traditional chung do kwan school in Pocatello, ID where teaches people of all ages both the art of chung do kwan and the principles of self-defense. Terry has also been trained in techniques used in judo, jiu-jitsu, karate, and One-on-One Control Tactics.

Dr. James Ferguson, Engineering Makes the World Go Around – Dr. Ferguson has degrees in mechanical engineering from Santa Clara University (bachelor's), Cornell University (master's) and Washington State University (doctorate). His area of specialty is in the thermal and fluid sciences. Before joining the faculty at Boise State University in 1996, he acquired 12 years of industrial experience working for ABB Power Generation in Switzerland on gas turbine and advanced fuel cell research and development projects. As a member of the mechanical engineering department, he teaches courses in thermodynamics, fluid mechanics, heat transfer and senior design.

Jeff Fogg, It Could Happen to You – Jeff has been studying the art of Chung Do Kwan Tae Kwon Do for over 16 years. He currently holds a 4th degree black belt through ChungDoKwan USA. Jeff has been an instructor for more than 12 years and currently teaches tae kwon do at Idaho State University in Idaho Falls. He has taught numerous self-defense seminars and classes to people of all ages. He has also been trained in many techniques used in judo, jiu-jitsu, karate, and One-on-One Control Tactics. Jeff also offers classes to the public through Teton Martial Arts in Idaho Falls.

Arnold Hernandez, Little Pond – Big Pond – Arnold was born in Monterey, Nuevo Leon, Mexico. When he was seven, his family migrated to Texas. Three years later, a compadre of the family convinced them to migrate to “El Norte,” where the three oldest kids and his parents would easily find work in the fields. After migrating within “El Norte” Oregon, Washington and Idaho, his family decided to settle down in Wilder, Idaho. They continued as seasonal workers and his family continued to grow. By the time Arnold reached ninth grade, it was time to leave school to work in the fields to help support his family. It didn't take long before he was convinced that life without education was not for him. After receiving his GED, his scores were high enough to meet college standards. Doors immediately began to open for him. He was offered a position as a home and school coordinator for the migrant program at the Wilder School District. Five years later, he enrolled at Boise State University where he received a degree in elementary education and was later employed as a counselor for the College Assistance Migrant Program (CAMP) for six years. For the past 14 years, he has been employed at The College of Idaho as a minority student counselor and as director of the Multi-Cultural Department.

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Carlos Ojeda Jr. – Carlos Ojeda Jr. received his bachelor's degree in Business Management with a Minor in Marketing from Bloomsburg University, his Master's in Business Administration with a focus in business development, entrepreneurship and organization development from Kutztown University. He is a member of the National Society of Hispanic MBAs. He has served on the Board of Directors for ASPIRA, Inc of Philadelphia, Board of Director for the Pennsylvania Statewide Latino Coalition and Board of Director of Raices, Inc. He is the founder and president of Distinct Communications and Carlos Ojeda Jr., Inc., yet still finds time to be a devoted husband to his wife, dedicated father to his son and committed to his family and community. He took on the role of Assistant Director of Admissions, Latino School and Community Liaison for Kutztown University of Pennsylvania and helped increase the enrollment of students of color from 4.6% to 16% in three years and then went on to become the youngest, first and only Latino business professor in the history of the University's College of Business. He then served as project coordinator of the Kutztown University AREYTO Project and as the Director of the Latino Business Resource Center. More recently he joined his longtime mentor Consuelo Castillo Kickbusch's company, Educational Achievement Services Inc. as National Director of SLICK,: Student Leadership Inspired by Consuelo Kickbusch.

Bryan Parker, Issues to Action B -- Professionally, Bryan is an organizational effectiveness practitioner, group facilitator, trainer and speaker. He is a certified professional facilitator (CPF) with the International Association of Facilitators and a certified master practitioner of Neuro-Linguistic Programming. Bryan has a broad base of experience in teambuilding and team dynamics, personal motivation strategies, leadership development, organizational effectiveness and communication, change management and meeting facilitation. Bryan is an internal organizational development consultant for Idaho National Laboratory. On a personal note, Bryan considers his family and his Boy Scout Troop to be the *real* human behavior laboratories in his life, and finds great fulfillment in these venues! A former college Academic All-American in Track & Field, his interests include learning, reading, running, Boy Scouting, coaching youth sports, the San Francisco Giants and rock climbing.

Guillermo Raya, Funding Today's Education – Guillermo Raya was born and raised in Idaho where he graduated from Rigby High School. He then later attended Lewis-Clark State College where he received his Bachelors in Business Administration and minor in Marketing. Guillermo has been honored to attend many conferences that dealt with Hispanics in higher education and interned for Student Action with Farmworkers in North Carolina; a nonprofit organization that connected college students with rural migrant workers. He also interned for the Congressional Hispanic Caucus Institute in Washington DC-where his focus on Hispanic issues landed him as the Speaker of the House Nancy Pelosi's intern. Guillermo is the first in his family to attend college from a migrant background and with the pressures of money he was able to finance 90% of his education through scholarships. As a past HYS student and volunteer, Guillermo's focus is now with higher education for Hispanic students in the state of Idaho.

Moises Diaz, Quien Crees Que Eres? – “Who Do You Think You Are?”-- Moises Diaz is originally from New York City. He has been in higher education administration since 1996. His multicultural work and education have taken him to over 30 different U.S. States as well as Mexico and Jamaica. After nearly dropping out of school in the 7th grade, he has successfully completed up to a master's degree in college and intends to pursue a PhD. His family is his #1 inspiration followed by the many students he serves.

Travis Spurgeon, Successfully Marketing Yourself to Employers-- Travis Spurgeon is the Talent Acquisition Manager at the Idaho National Laboratory. He has been involved with technical and executive recruiting for over ten years. He earned a bachelor's degree in justice studies with a minor in communications from Arizona State University. Travis and his team take pride in recruiting a diverse and technical workforce to join the Idaho National Laboratory

Frank and his mother, father and three brothers followed the summer harvest in central California. They would return to their home in Pasadena so the boys could start school. Frank always worked on ideas to have fun. He also had a burning desire to seek new horizons. He was a "self-made" man who succeeded in fulfilling his dreams of adventure and helping others to succeed in life.

Frank went into the Army in 1945. After returning home in 1947, he went to the Mechanical Engineering and Design School in Pasadena. It was then when he discovered a real desire to learn and explore, especially engineering and math. Throughout his life he provided leadership and served as a role model to members of the communities in which he lived. Frank loved his Hispanic heritage and loved the way his family embraced it. Frank's zest for life was exceeded only by an unquenchable thirst for knowledge. His motto for life was "TENGO MUCHAS GANAS." Frank passed away April 23, 1996.
